It brings to the forefront our need to become better versed in the political and economic variables – the ideologies if you will – by which we and the rest of the world frame our day to day existence. Concepts like democracy, capitalism, communism, socialism must become a regular part of our dialogue. The principles tied to liberal, conservative and alternative political views must be clearly defined accordingly. And this should be, no this must be, taken up as a mandate within our educational processes.
